BCCC continued to build impactful collaborations with local hospitals, community organizations, and academic institutions, enhancing both translational research and outreach efforts. Notably, the center hosted its inaugural Cancer Equity Symposium, drawing participants from across the borough to address disparities in cancer outcomes and access to care.

As we look ahead to FY26, our priorities include securing new grant funding, deepening community partnerships, and advancing innovative research with a focus on the borough of Brooklyn.

A special note of gratitude is extended to the founding directors, Professors **Maria Contel** and **Jennifer Basil**, who concluded their five-year tenure this year.

Their visionary leadership and unwavering dedication laid the foundation for the center's growth and impact.

We are deeply grateful for their service and legacy.

MISSION

The Brooklyn College Cancer Center (BCCC) is a campus-based initiative dedicated to advancing cancer research, education, and community outreach. Through interdisciplinary collaboration with faculty and students, BCCC translates scientific discoveries into real-world applications while supporting academic and professional development.

INTEGRATION

Core research areas include computational drug design, anticancer therapeutics, epigenetics, nanotechnology, inflammation, and photomedicine—targeting such cancers as ovarian, breast, head and neck, prostate, glioma, and mesothelioma.

BCCC actively engages funders across foundation, government, and corporate sectors, aligning with Brooklyn College's capital projects to create mutual benefits for the center and the broader campus.

THREE-PRONGED APPROACH

1. College

BCCC fosters interdisciplinary research and education, preparing students for careers in science and health care while advancing impactful cancer research.

2. Community


Rooted in Brooklyn's diverse neighborhoods, BCCC promotes cancer education, early detection, and career pathways in advocacy and care.

3. Business

BCCC supports innovation through technology transfer, entrepreneurship, and small business development in areas like medical devices, computational tools, and drug discovery.

AT A GLANCE

In FY25, BCCC achieved major milestones in operations, partnerships, research, and outreach. Highlights included launching promotional videos, redesigning systems, planning new facilities, securing American Cancer Society and Gray Foundation grants, and hosting major events like the Cancer Health Disparities Symposium and Al & Stem Cell Training Workshop. Education efforts included career readiness training and the Cancer Prevention Volunteer cohort. Outreach expanded through screenings, advocacy, and community events.



Looking ahead, BCCC will focus on leadership transition, expanding disparities research, strengthening advisory efforts, and pursuing new funding.

RESEARCH AND COMMUNITY INTEGRATION

As of June 2025, BCCC includes 25 faculty (16 cancer-focused), one clinician scientist partner (Memorial Sloan Kettering), two postdocs, 19 doctoral students, six master's students, two research associates, one assistant, and more than 40 undergraduates. Around 30 students annually participate in health education and outreach through partnerships with medical institutions.

RESEARCH SPANS THREE AREAS:

- 1. Cancer Biology and Biochemistry
- 2. Drug Development and Delivery
- 3. Patient-Oriented Research

Faculty come from the departments of Chemistry and Biochemistry, Biology, Health and Nutrition Sciences, Psychology, and Computer Science. Key partners include Brooklyn College School of Natural and Behavioral Sciences Dean Peter Tolias, CUNY Graduate Center Dean for the Sciences Brian Gibney, and community collaborator Associate Professor Michael Menser. BCCC works closely with Brooklyn College's Immigrant Student Success Office, Haitian Studies Institute, Caribbean Studies Program, Health Services, and Health Clinic, co-hosting events and initiatives across departments.

GENERAL FUNCTIONING OF THE CENTER

BCCC streamlined administrative operations, including processing reassigned time, managing grant subawards, and overseeing research foundation accounts for interns, scholars, and events. Promotional efforts included flyer design, social media management, and production of outreach and fundraising videos.

Operational enhancements involved updating accounting systems, onboarding materials, and impact tracking tools. The team held weekly meetings, supported recruitment events, and organized lectures. Plans are in progress for permanent office space and a teaching lab. The center supervised six interns.

PARTNERSHIPS, FUNDRAISING, AND GRANT SUBMISSIONS

BCCC maintains active partnerships with such institutions as Maimonides, SUNY Downstate, Memorial Sloan Kettering, Mount Sinai, Weill Cornell, and CUNY centers, along with outreach collaborations with Janssen and Genentech. The American Cancer Society DICR IDG Grant (\$2.7 million over four years) supports pilot grants, postdocs, master's scholars, and summer internships. In 2024–25, four pilot projects, one master's scholar, and two postdocs were selected, along with six underrepresented undergraduate interns.

Additional funding includes a renewed \$100,000 Gray Foundation grant and funds raised via Giving Tuesday. Grant proposals were submitted focusing on workforce diversity and community engagement.

BRIDGING SCIENCE AND SOCIETY: RESEARCH, EDUCATION, AND COMMUNITY ACTION

RESEARCH

BCCC continued its American Cancer Society–
supported Molecular Modeling Lab and issued 2025
sub-award calls. Quarterly meetings with American
Cancer Society mentors and officers guided
mentoring and capacity-building. Four pilot grants
were awarded across biology, health, and chemistry.
Six undergraduates and one master's scholar received
funded research training.

Grant support enabled internships for undergraduates and high school students, mentoring grants for doctoral students, and travel awards for conference participation. Faculty initiatives included a monthly research group, Cancer Health Disparities Symposium, and planning for a Community Advisory Board. The center hosted 12 seminars, Al and stem-cell training sessions, and participated in American Cancer Society CAN's Policy Forum. Research output included 15 federal grant submissions, two awards, 10 internal grants, 37 publications, 13 abstracts, and two patents. Two doctoral students successfully defended their dissertations.



EDUCATION

BCCC provided educational opportunities through information sessions, training programs, and internships. Students participated in stem-cell workshops; shadowing at Maimonides, Memorial Sloan Kettering Cancer Center, and Mount Sinai; and volunteer roles with the American Cancer Society and Red Door. The Memorial Sloan Kettering COOL program remained active, with one student selected for summer training.

The center coordinated with Brooklyn College's Pre-Health Services to share opportunities via digital platforms. Summer internships were supported by grants, alongside an eight-week career readiness program led by CUNY's dean of sciences. In summer 2025, BCCC launched its first Cancer Prevention Volunteer cohort in partnership with Tisch Cancer Center and Brooklyn College.

COMMUNITY OUTREACH

BCCC collaborates with community organizations and medical partners across Brooklyn and New York City, including Maimonides, Memorial Sloan Kettering, Mount Sinai, SUNY Downstate, and the American Cancer Society. The center coordinated with Brooklyn College's pre-health professions office. The center actively participates in coalitions like the New York State American Cancer Society HPV Coalition and Cancer Equity Accelerator Cabinet.

Outreach efforts included cancer prevention sessions, major awareness events like the American Cancer Society Making Strides Walk, and educational programs with partners such as the Leukemia & Lymphoma Society and Kings County Hospital. BCCC also joined advocacy days in Albany, New York, and Washington, D.C., co-sponsored health fairs, and supported screenings and expert panels—engaging hundreds of students, staff, and community members.

OPPORTUNITIES

By 2028, the program aims to increase cancer-focused grant submissions, support career transitions, and enhance mentoring for junior faculty. Contributed income is expected to benefit 13 principal investigators, two postdocs, six master's students, and 22 undergraduates, while supporting research assistants and organizing seminars to foster interdisciplinary cancer research in drug development, disparities, and prevention.
