History 3290, Winter Intersession Study Abroad, Porto, Portugal. Special Topics in European History: Portugal - History, People and Culture 3 hours, 3 credits

Professor: Christopher Ebert, History department - Brooklyn College.

Course Description:

This course is an overview of the history of Portugal from its founding monarchies during the Middle Ages through its integration in the European Union in the present day. Classes and field trips will introduce students to the history of the country through the lens of politics, society, religion, food, culture and Portugal's extensive empire in Africa, Asia and South America. Along with the instructor, who is a historian of early-modern Portuguese imperial expansion, students will interact with period specialists to understand Portuguese history into the modern world, as well as contemporary Portuguese culture and society.

Objectives of Course:

- 1. Introduce students to the history and culture of Portugal.
- 2. Train students in the interpretation of primary and secondary sources in a variety of contexts.
- 3. Enable students to articulate the major socio-political trends which have characterized Portugal over many centuries.
- 4. Develop in students the analytical skills needed to critique and employ written sources in their argumentation.
- 5. Enable students to articulate their interpretation of primary and secondary sources in class discussions.
- 6. Offer students a hands-on, interactive experience of contemporary Portuguese society, including meeting local people and experiencing culture and foodways.

Outcomes Anticipated for Course:

By the end of this course students will have:

- 1. Mastered at an appropriate level the historical content relevant to the topic.
- 2. Demonstrated in discussion and short writing assignments knowledge of how Portugal has developed over time.
- 3. Evaluated critically in discussion and writing the assigned texts.
